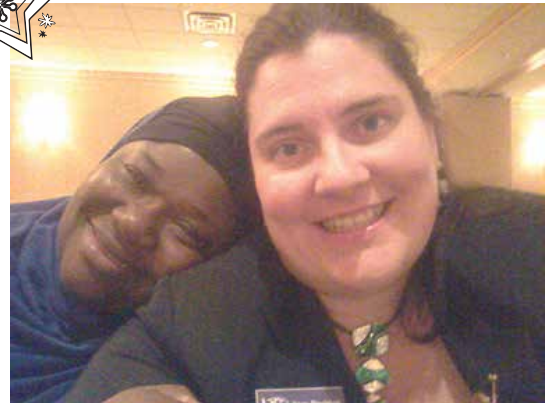

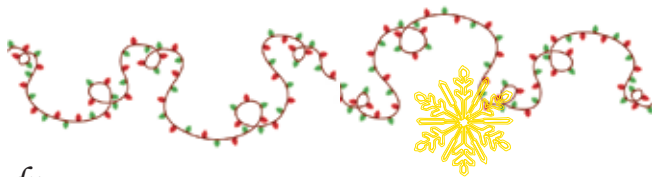

Gaddis (president/Tennessee Federation of Business and Professional Women, Bettye Coleman King, who was honored recently for her 65 years of membership in the Rockwood BPW and Linda Rector, president of the Rockwood BPW local organization.

In October at a meeting commemorating National Business Women's Week, Bettye Coleman King was honored for her 65 years of continuous membership in the Rockwood BPW local organization. Ms. King is a native of Rockwood, having graduating from Rockwood High School. She then obtained Bachelor's and Master's degrees from the University of Tennessee. She returned to Rockwood and taught her entire career at Rockwood High School.



Other special guests at the October meeting were Senator and Mrs. Ken Yager.

In addition to being an honored member of Rockwood BPW, Ms. King is a lifelong member of First Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), Rockwood, the Roane County Retired Teacher's Association and Delta Kappa Gamma sorority.

Rockwood BPW was organized on Saturday, October 22, 1921, a mere two years after the Tennessee Federation of Business and Professional Women was chartered. Rockwood BPW was one of the first rural organizations in the state federation, is the oldest civic organization in Rockwood and one of the oldest in Roane County. Rockwood BPW was instrumental in establishing the Rockwood Public Library in 1922. The organization continues to serve the community in many ways, with one of the primary areas being the awarding of two scholarships annually to a Rockwood High School graduate. Rockwood BPW also maintains membership in the Roane County Chamber of Commerce, recognizing the importance of such organizations for healthy communities.
