MARCH is **WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH**

Women's History Month is an annual declared month that highlights the contributions of women to events in history and contemporary society. It is celebrated during March in the United States, the United Kingdom, and Australia, corresponding with International Women's Day on March 8th.


In 1987, Congress passed Pub. L. 100-9 which designated the month of March 1987 as Women's History Month. Between 1988 and 1994, Congress passed additional resolutions requesting and authorizing the President to proclaim March of each year as Women's History Month. Since 1988, U.S. presidents have issued annual proclamations designating the month of March as Women's History Month.

State departments of education also began to encourage celebrations of Women's History Month as a way to promote equality among the sexes in the classroom. Maryland, Pennsylvania, Alaska, New York, Oregon, and other states developed and distributed curriculum materials in all of their public schools, which prompted educational events such as essay contests. Within a few years, thousands of schools and communities began to celebrate Women's History Month. They planned engaging and stimulating programs about women's roles in history and society, with support and encouragement from governors, city councils, school boards, and the U.S. Congress.


In March 2011, the Barack Obama administration released a report, Women in America: Indicators of Social and Economic Well-Being, showing women's status in the U.S. in 2011 and how it had changed over time. This report was the first comprehensive federal report on women since the report produced by the Commission on the Status of Women in 1963.

Some organizations have issued statements marking Women's History Month, for example the Republican National Committee and the Democratic National Committee.

A President's Commission on the Celebration of Women in History in America recently sponsored hearings in many parts of the country. The Women's Progress Commission will soon conduct hearings to promote interest in preserving areas that are relevant in American women's history. Some of the groups promoting this interest are state historical societies, women's organizations, and groups such as the Girl Scouts of the USA.

EQUAL PAY DAY April 10th



What Is Equal Pay Day? Here's Everything You Need to Know

The reason Equal Pay Day is on a Tuesday in April

Equal Pay Day was started by the National Committee on Pay Equity (NCPE) in 1996 to highlight the gap between men and women's wages. Equal Pay Day is held every April to symbolize how far into the year women need to work to make what men did in the previous year, according to the NCPE. It is always on Tuesday to "represent how far into the next work week women must work to earn what men earned the previous week." In other words, because women earn less on average, they must work longer for the same pay.

How the fight for equal pay got political



In 1963, President John F. Kennedy signed the Equal Pay Law, which made it illegal to pay women lower rates for the same job as their male counterparts on the basis of gender. At the time, women earned 59 percent of men's wages. By 2000, women earned 74 percent of men's wages.

In 2009, President Barack Obama overturned a Supreme Court decision that said employees could not bring a salary dis-

crimination suit if more than 180 days passed since the initial wage discrimination occurred, even if it had continued, by signing the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act. The act prohibits gender-based discrimination and allows women to fight back against discrimination in the workplace regardless of when it began.

Are we making progress?

It's still slow. In 2014, Senate Republicans unanimously blocked legislation on equal pay. The bill would have made it illegal for employers to punish workers who discuss their salaries. The aim was to close a wage gap that found women making 77 cents for every dollar that men earn.

However, this number is not true for all women. While women across all races and ethnicities lag behind those of white men, as well as men in their own racial or ethnic group, minority women face greater challenges in this regard. Data from a 2016 study illustrates that while white, non-Hispanic women make 83 cents for every dollar, Black women make 66 cents, and Hispanic women make 60 cents.

So where are we now?



On March 27, 2017 President Donald Trump pulled back the 2014 Fair Pay & Safe Workplaces order put in place by Obama to protect women in the workplace.

It's clear that women's fight for pay equity and work opportunities is far from over. In fact, it will take 169 years for the world to completely close the economic gender gap. Equal Pay Day is a reminder that despite some progress, the wage gap persists, and women have a way to go when it comes to economic equality.



Nominations for State Office

In January each local organization and other BPW/TN members will be receiving information on candidates for office for the 2018-2019 BPW/TN year. Each Local Organization member seeking office must be endorsed by her local organization and complete the form correctly. Members at Large who wish to run for state office may obtain a Data Form for Members at Large from the website under Resources, State forms or from the nominating committee chair. [Members at Large are not eligible for the offices of Regional Director.] Members at Large who wish to be a candidate for state office should send their forms to the committee chair, Tressy Hart. Forms are also posted on the website www.bpwtn.org. Forms in duplicate, and pictures for candidates for state office and regional director must be returned to the nominating committee chair or committee member no later than April 16, 2018. Please send digital copies of pictures. All candidates for state office or regional director must have been a member of BPW/TN for at least two years as of the convention at which they are candidates. Candidates for line officers, President, President-elect and 1st & 2nd Vice President, must have served as president of a local organization, current or past, in Tennessee. [Bylaws, Article XII].

As there is no president-elect this year, the nominating committee will be accepting nominations for president for 2018-2019. The same procedures will be followed as for other state officers.

March Highlights in US Women's History

March 1, 1978 – Women's History Week is first observed in Sonoma County, California

March 1, 1987 – Congress passes a resolution designating March as Women's History Month

March 3, 1913 – **Women's Suffrage Parade in Washington, DC, where over** 8000 women gathered to demand a constitutional amendment guaranteeing the right to vote

March 4, 1917 – Jeannette Rankin (R-MT) took her seat as the first female member of Congress

March 4, 1933 – Frances Perkins becomes United States Secretary of Labor, the first female member of the United States Cabinet

March 8 – International Women's Day, whose origins trace back to protests in the U.S. and Europe to honor and fight for the political rights for working women

March 8, 2014 - National Catholic Sisters

Week www.nationalcatholicsistersweek.org established to raise awareness of the contributions of Catholic sisters

March 11, 1993 – Janet Reno is confirmed as the first woman U.S. Attorney General

March 12, 1912 – Juliette Gordon Low assembled 18 girls together in Savannah, Georgia, for the first-ever Girl Scout meeting

March 13, 1986 – Susan Butcher won the first of 3 straight and 4 total Iditarod Trail Sled Dog Races in Alaska

March 17, 1910 – Camp Fire Girls is established as the first interracial, non-sectarian American organization for girls

March 20, 1852 – Harriet Beecher Stowe's novel, "Uncle Tom's Cabin," is published and becomes the best-selling book of the 19th century

March 21, 1986 – Debi Thomas becomes first African American woman to win the World Figure Skating Championship

March 23, 1917 – Virginia Woolf establishes the Hogarth Press with her husband, Leonard Woolf

March 31, 1888 – The National Council of Women of the U.S. is organized by Susan B. Anthony, Clara Barton, Julia Ward Howe, and Sojourner Truth, among others, the oldest non-sectarian women's organization in the U.S.

March 31, 1776 – Abigail Adams writes to her husband John who is helping to frame the Declaration of Independence and cautions, "Remember the ladies..."
