

Article X. Organization SECTION 2. Each region shall have a director who shall be elected at the annual state convention after the endorsement of her local organization. Regional directors shall be members of the state executive committee and the board of directors. A term of office shall be one (1) year, or until a successor is elected. A Regional director shall have served as area coordinator, district director, local organization president, or as a member of the executive committee.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of the regional director to:

Act as a liaison officer between districts and the state organization. Serve as a member of the state executive committee.

Serve as a member of the state board of directors.

d) Plan a meeting of the local organizations in the fall, not later than September 15, to discuss program objectives for the year. This meeting may be held by teleconference call. Time and place to be determined by the Regional Director but subject to the approval of the state president.

SECTION 4. Regional meetings shall be held in the spring, time and place to be determined by the regional directors, subject to the approval of the state president. SECTION 5. . Each region shall be divided into such districts as may be set up and approved by the board of directors. If any region does not contain two (2) or more districts, it shall be considered as having one district, and the regional director shall function as the district director of the region. District directors shall be elected at the spring regional meeting after the written endorsement of her local organization. A majority of all votes cast shall elect. SECTION 6. Regional planning meetings shall be held not later than September 15, time and place

To remove the Regional Director from the Executive Committee; to let Regions elect their Directors and Secretary-Treasurer at the Regional meeting. To remove references to districts.

Section 2. Each region shall have a director and a secretary-treasurer who shall be elected at the spring regional meeting by the members of the region in attendance at that meeting. A quorum of at least two local organizations and no fewer than five local organization members in good standing from that region must be present and voting for a valid election. A majority vote is required to elect. The term of office is for one year or until a successor is elected. A Regional Director shall have previously served as area coordinator, district director, local organization president, or on the state executive committee and shall have the endorsement of her local organiza-

Section 3. The Regional Director shall:

- (a) work closely with the local organization presidents in her region to assist with membership goals and program implementation as needed, and
- (b) serve as a member of the state board of directors.

Section 4. The Regional Director shall plan a meeting of the local organizations in the fall, no later than September 15, to discuss program and membership objectives for the year. This meeting may be held by teleconference call. The time and place is to be determined by the Regional Director but subject to the approval of the state president.

Section 4. The Regional Director shall plan a meeting in the spring, no later than 60 days before the opening of the state convention to assess program and membership accomplishments, and to elect a new regional director and regional secretary-treasurer. The time and place is determined by the Regional Director subject to the approval of the state president.

Section 5. The Regional Secretary -Treasurer shall keep the records of the Region, both for membership and financial status. She shall notify the state president of the results of the regional election within 5 days of the election.

Sterling Awards 2019

The Sterling Awards 2019: 20 Most Influential Women in West Tennessee ceremony was held on April 2, Equal Pay Day, at the Hamilton Performing Arts Center at University of Memphis Lambuth in Jackson, Tenn. The event highlighted the 100-year anniversary of the formation of Jackson Area Business & Professional Women in the Carnegie Library in Jackson. The awards, created in 2010, are a partnership between JABPW and The Jackson Sun. A crowd of about 300 attended the presentation.

"Each year, I think we have the best group of winners, and every year, I'm impressed again with the quality of these outstanding women," said Wanda Stanfill, Sterling Awards director and vice-president, JABPW.

The evening's presenters included: Jackson Mayor Jerry Gist; Madison County Mayor Jimmy Harris; Stanfill, Sterling Awards director; Jacque Hillman, JABPW president; Beth Bates, Sue Shelton White historian; Mary Jo Middlebrooks, 2018 Sue Shelton White Award winner; Michelle Thompson, Regional Manager, The Commercial Appeal/The Jackson Sun; and Mike Jung, President, The Commercial Appeal. Vocal performers were Laurice Lanier, Artist-in-Residence and Professor of Music at Lane College, and Esther Lemus, Professor of Music, Jackson State Community College.

Lexington: Dinah Harris, Director of Jackson-Madison County Library; Medina: Vanessa Presson, Complex Human Resource Manager, Tyson plant, Humboldt; Milan: Stacy Miller, President/CEO of Tennessee Correctional Services West, Inc.; Dr. Lisa Piercey, Commissioner, Tennessee Department of Health. MD, MBA, FAAP. Somerville: Kara Tapp, Director, UT Martin Somerville Center.

Winners from Jackson are: Sheila Arnold, retired teacher, Jackson Madison County School System; part-time coordinator for the Writing Lab, University of Memphis Lambuth; Sydney Ball, Regional Business Development Manager, First Citizens National Bank in Dyersburg and Middle Tennessee market; FirstCNB's Corporate Office in Dyersburg; Sue Ann Barnes, retired professor and long-time past president, Friends of the Library; Katie Brantley, County Commissioner District 5, Position 3; Terri Graham-Chism, Eligibility Counselor II for the State of Tennessee; Dawn Mooney, Owner, PC Paladins; Linda Rizzuto, retired from Procter & Gamble in information technology; Janet Silver, President, Roberts Jewelers, Jackson; Dr. Michelle Curtain Stewart, Vice president for academic affairs; associate professor of sociology at Lane College; and Dr. Vivian Cawthon Williams, Chief of Student Support and Improvement for the Jackson Madison County School System.

Also honored was the Outstanding Woman Military Veteran, Debbie O'Bryant, U.S. Navy (Ret.) Commander, of Cedar Grove in Carroll County. On her last tour of duty she served at the American Embassy in Cairo, Egypt, where she held the position of the first Navy Liaison Officer in the Office of Military Cooperation. She will serve the State Department in Portugal in Fall 2019.

The Sue Shelton White Award honors activist Jocelyn Dan Wurzburg, who founded the local Panel of American Women in 1968 to address prejudice. Serving Gov. Winfield Dunn on the Tennessee Human Rights Commission, she wrote Tennessee's first anti-discrimination law in employment, public accommodations, and housing. She pursued mediation as a saner divorce process, becoming Memphis' first professional mediator. She founded the Mediation Association of Tennessee.

Since the Sterling Awards launch in 2010, 20 women have been honored each year, chosen by a Board of Selectors from around 80 nominations annually. Nominations are submitted in January. The judges read through many pages citing awards, leadership and volunteerism.

The attributes that qualify a woman to win a Sterling Award include action for the betterment of all, which is key in West Tennessee communities. These winners have taken their skills – their intelligence, intuition and perseverance and worked to attain great goals. These women shape their towns and communities with public policy, fundraising, government leadership, involvement in education, healthcare and the arts.

The winners were outstanding in these categories: government and public service; small business/entrepreneur; business and technology; service (community/non-profit); education; labor/manufacturing; healthcare, legal and other fields.

"These women choose to live their lives with courageous commitment to helping their communities thrive," said Stanfill. "We hope that our West Tennesseans continue honoring these women through nominations."
