Memphis Suffrage Monument Installed in Downtown Memphis



After five years in the works, the Memphis Suffrage Monument, "Equality Trailblazers," has been installed on the promenade behind the University of Memphis law school facing the Mississippi River.

A celebration of the installation and the women and men honored by the monument will be held on Sunday, March 27, at 1 pm CDT via Downtown Memphis Commission's YouTube channel.

The <u>Downtown Memphis Commission</u> and <u>TN</u> <u>Suffrage Heritage Trail</u> will also make the video

available on their websites following the event. Many of those involved with the monument will speak, including Michelle Duster, author, public historian, and great-granddaughter of Ida B. Wells.

"We are delighted this monument is at the law school telling the story of these remarkable people who helped American women win the right to vote with Tennessee's ratification of the 19th Amendment in 1920," said Paula Casey, chair of the Memphis Suffrage Monument Committee. "We honor those whose careers were made possible by the suffragists' victory who also fought for equality for all Americans. All American women vote today thanks to Tennessee."

Alan LeQuire of Nashville (www.alanlequire.com) is the artist/sculptor who began work on the monument in 2016. He has worked on five suffrage monuments in the state, two in Nashville, two in Knoxville, and one in Memphis. He has stated he wants to spend the rest of his career memorializing these women in statuary.

BPW Member honored by City of Jackson Mayor

Mayor Scott Conger of the City of Jackson honored 31 most influential women in the city —one for each day of Women's History Month. Jackson Area BPW member Mary Jo Middlebrooks was one of the recipients.

In 1978, Middlebrooks became the first female trial attorney in Jackson, TN in 50 years. She and two other lawyers organized West Tennessee Legal Services, Inc., providing a voice for the indigent in 17 counties. She has mentored two generations of female attorneys, helping charter the Tennessee Lawyers' Association for Women, and the local Lawyers Association for Women.

For civil rights advocacy and service to victims of domestic violence she has been honored by the Jackson-Madison County NAACP and the Wo/men's Resource and Rape Assistance Program. Middlebrooks is one of only 11 Tennessee lawyers certified as a Family Law Specialist. Thank you Mary Jo for your service! You are greatly appreciated by us all.



BPW Member receives the Lydia Darragh Medal

Jackie Utley, a member of Jackson Area BPW, was recently named the Southeastern Division Winner of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) Service to Veterans Award for service by a DAR member. Jackie also received the Lydia Darragh Medal from Dr. Ryan Bartz, president of the James Madison Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR).

The Lydia Darragh Medal may be awarded by the incumbent President General, Vice President General, State Society President or Chapter President to the lady who has provided significant service to him during

his term of office. The medal recognizes the assistance of the women who work behind the scenes supporting SAR programs.

Jackie has certainly done that! She works tirelessly supporting numerous programs for veterans within her community and has received numerous accommodations for her efforts. Due to COVID restrictions, Jackie has been very innovative and lead her teams to make changes in how previous programs were executed.

Easter commemorates Jesus' resurrection three days after his crucifixion and death. Following his death, he was removed from the cross and buried in a tomb. On Sunday, Jesus' tomb was found empty. Angels informed onlookers that Jesus had risen. Throughout the next 40 days, Jesus appeared to his apostles and disciples before finally ascending to heaven.

Easter is the highest and holiest of holidays in the Christian faith. It is celebrated on the first Sunday following the first full moon after the spring equinox, usually occurring between March 22 and April 25.

Easter Facts

- For many Christian congregations, the first Easter service for the year is the Service of Light. The worship typically starts in darkness on the preceding Saturday night or early Sunday morning. Light is brought into the church with candles to signify hope based on the resurrection. The service culminates with the lighting of a paschal candle, signifying Christ.
- Easter eggs represent new life and also symbolize the shape of Jesus' tomb.
- The colors for Easter are white and gold. Easter lilies are popular decorations in American churches. These white blooms are one of the earliest flowers to bloom in the spring and symbolize beauty, purity, and holiness.
- Easter also signifies the end of Lent, the 40-day period of fasting, preparation, and penitence observed by the faithful.

Easter season starts on Easter Sunday and lasts 40 days until Pentecost. The date for Easter is determined by the moon. Easter is the Sunday after the first full moon of spring.
