Did You Know.....

- 1. September 12, 1910 Alice Stebbins Wells, a former social worker, becomes the first woman police officer with arrest powers in the U.S. (Los Angeles, CA)
- 2. September 14, 1964 Helen Keller receives the Presidential Medal of Freedom along with 4 other women: Dr. Lena Edwards, Lynn Fontainne, Dr. Helen Taussig, and Leontyne Price
- 3. September 14, 1975 Elizabeth Ann Seton is canonized and becomes the first American-born saint, founded the first U.S. Order of the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph
- 4. September 20, 1973 Billie Jean King defeats Bobby "No-Broad-Can-Beat-Me" Riggs in the battle of the sexes tennis match
- 5. September 25, 1981 Sandra Day O'Connor is sworn in as the first woman U.S. Supreme Court Justice
- 6.The name "September" comes from an old Roman word, "septem," which actually means 7. That's right September was the seventh month of the year on the Roman calendar It did not become the ninth month until the advent of the Gregorian calendar.
- 7. The Romans believed that September was looked after by the god of fire. So they always expected fires and volcanic eruptions to occur during this month.
- 8. Out of all 12 months of the year, September is spelled with the most letters. It contains nine letters, and it happens to be the ninth month of the year. No other months have the same amount of letters as their number in the calendar year.
- 9. This September "Harvest Moon" is the fullest moon of the year. When you gaze at it, it looks very large and gives a lot of light throughout the entire night. No other lunar spectacle is as awesome as the Harvest Moon.
- 10. The first day of fall is typically on September 22 or September 23 in North America. This is when the hours in the day are almost equal to the hours in the night. This occurs at the same time as the Spring Equinox does in Australia.
- 11. Mothers work now than ever before.

Tennesseans to Face 4 Constitutional Amendments in November

Tennesseans will be asked to vote on four proposed amendments to the state constitution on Nov. 8. To pass, any amendment must receive more "yes" votes than "no" votes, and the number of "yes" votes must be greater than the majority of the total votes cast in the gubernatorial election. WBIR looks at each of the amendments, which include the following

Amendment 1: Right-to-Work;

Amendment 2: Assigning an Acting Governor;

Amendment 3: Removing Slavery as a Punishment for Crime; and

Amendment 4: Removing the Religious Minister Disqualification.



NBWW 2022—October 16th thru 22nd

To honor the contributions of working women and employers who support working women and their families, Business and Professional Women celebrates <u>National Business Women's Week® (NBWW)</u> during the third week <u>of October.</u>

<u>National Business Women's Week®</u> provides an opportunity to call attention to women entrepreneurs, facilitate discussions on the needs of working women, share information about successful workplace policies, and raise awareness of the resources available for working women in their communities.

NBWW is a nationwide salute to all working women and provides an opportunity to discuss:

- · the needs of working women
- · share information about successful workplace policies
- · raise awareness of resources available for women
- highlight the progress made by women business owners



NBWW History

The concept of National Business Women's Week® originated with Emma Dot Partridge, Executive Secretary of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs from 1924 to 1927. The first annual observance of NBWW was held April 15-22, 1928, when National President Lena Madesin Phillips opened the week with a nationally broadcast speech. She stated that the purpose of the week was "to focus public attention upon a better business woman for a better business world." From this early effort, NBWW has grown into a nationwide salute to all working women.

The program for the first observance of NBWW included: Legislative Day devoted to national, state and local legislation of interest to women; Education Day devoted to emphasizing the need for equitable educational opportunities; Club Rally Day for prospective new members; Community Day honoring leaders in the community; and Goodwill Day devoted to working with other women's organizations.

In 1938, NBWW was moved to the third full week of October. U.S. President Herbert Hoover was the first president to issue a letter recognizing NBWW and the contributions and achievements of working women.

The third full week in October ushers in National Business Women's Week each year. The observance focuses on the accomplishments of women in business. It also takes a look at the past and how far women in business have come and how far they have yet to go. Every year, women in the workforce take on stronger, more empowering roles.

The celebration of NBWW has helped to promote leadership roles for women and to increase opportunities for their advancement professionally and personally.

Every year, women in the workforce take on stronger, more empowering roles. They run their own businesses, take charge of the boardroom, and build upon last year's successes. At one time, very few women even had a voice.



Today, women-owned businesses generate nearly \$1.8 trillion in sales. Of privately-owned companies, women own 40 percent of them and employ almost 9 million people. Their contributions to the economy cannot go unnoticed.

What's important to note are their roles continue to change. When once their place in the boardroom would have been considered questionable, today, it's now becoming commonplace. They're also successful at what they do.
